Important Notices

Congress Room is the **TOWN HALL**.

OPENING CEREMONY will take place in the Congress Room on Monday, 18th August, at 2.0 p.m.

Completion of Games. On the completion of a game, the players must replace the pieces.

NOTE.—TOURNAMENT RULE NO. 20.

“The **Winner** of a game shall deliver to the Controller in Charge an intelligible signed record of the moves made in the game, using a recognised system of notation and indicating clearly the result of the game. In the case of a **Drawn Game** both **Competitors** shall deliver such records, but one such record—signed by both players—will be accepted. These records must indicate the tournament and the round of which the game is part. The result of the game shall not be officially recognised until these records have been delivered, unless the Controller in Charge agrees to accept other evidence.”

Players must not discuss their games in the Congress Room. All analysis must take place in the room provided for this purpose.

“**Five Minutes Chess**” is strictly prohibited, owing to the risk of damage to clocks.

Games adjourned from the Morning Tournaments must be resumed in the Adjourned Games Room in the afternoon from 2-30 to 6-30 p.m.; but games adjourned from the Afternoon Tournaments must be resumed in the Congress Room from 8-30 to 10-30 p.m. with the exception that games adjourned from the Afternoon Tournaments on Tuesday, 20th August will be resumed at 9-0 a.m. on the following morning in the Adjourned Games Room. Where a third session is necessary the Tournament Controllers shall determine the time for the resumption of all such games.

Light Refreshments will be available between 10-30 a.m. and 6-30 p.m.

Prizes will be distributed in the Congress Room at 10-0 a.m. on Saturday, 30th August by the Mayoress of Leamington (Mrs. Frank Gundry).

Swiss Tournament Rules

1. Eleven rounds shall be played, except in the British Boys' under 18 Championship where twelve rounds shall be played.
2. A competitor shall play any other competitor once only.
3. Subject to the operation of Rule 2 above, each competitor shall be paired in each round with another competitor, whose score is equal to his or, if that is not possible, with one of those competitors whose scores are most nearly equal to his.
4. In allocating the move, the Committee will endeavour to give each competitor the white men and the black men in alternate games, but the conditions of the competition will not allow this to be guaranteed.
5. For pairing purposes, the Committee may apply the Sonneborne-Berger or other system of scoring to break ties, but such system or systems will not be used for the allocation of prizes.
6. Should a competitor for any reason withdraw from the tournament, his score for the purpose of pairing in subsequent rounds shall be regarded as 0 (nil), and the competitors with whom he is subsequently paired (other than another withdrawn competitor) shall be deemed to have won their games.
7. The Committee reserves the right to postpone the commencement of any round until all the games from previous rounds have been played to a finish.
8. For the purpose of allocating competitors to a score for pairing purposes, unfinished games may be temporarily adjudicated, but all such unfinished games shall be played to a finish during the course of the competition.
9. The Committee reserves the right to adjudicate on any matter arising out of or not covered by the foregoing rules, and to interpret these rules.
10. In the event of any dispute arising from the above, the Committee shall consist of the three Controllers. In the absence of any one of these three, the two officials present shall co-opt a deputy. The decision of the Committee shall be final.

PROMOTIONS and EXEMPTIONS

CHAMPIONSHIP.

Only four prizewinners shall be exempted to the final in the following year, and in the event of ties these shall be determined by application of the added scores of such players' opponents, the player(s) with the highest score(s) being exempted.

MAJOR OPEN.

The highest eligible placed player will be entitled to compete in the British Championship in 1959. In the event of a tie it shall be determined by application of the added scores of such players' opponents, the player with highest score being the successful competitor.

FIRST AND SECOND CLASSES.

The winners of the First and Second Class Tournaments will be entitled to compete in the Major Open and First Class respectively in 1959. Ties to be determined as for the Major Open.
